[Government Meetings] Development, Government Minds Meet JACOB OGLES, JACOB.OGLES@SRQMEDIAGROUP.COM

Business and government officials were cordial, even jovial, with one another at a "problem-solving" meeting Wednesday morning at Sarasota City Hall. Builders reported that permits have moved more smoothly through the bureaucratic process, particularly this year, but all also acknowledged that was in part because less development has happened of late than in the past.

Mary Dougherty-Slapp, executive director of the Gulf Coast Builders Exchange, said her members related permitting in Sarasota was "extremely user-friendly and timely." She would like things to stay that way, she said, and things conversations like those Wednesday will help with that goal. "If there is ever a perception of us versus them, then this is to break that down."

City Manager Bob Bartolotta said the intention of the problem-solving events, which he plans to hold monthly, is to have an arena where problems can be spotlighted bluntly. "We want to solve problems on the spot if we can, and if we can't, we will work on the processes, and if we can't, we will work on the codes," he said. "There is not going to be any retribution for things said here. Feel free to vent."

One issue that was discussed is the level of permitting happening in the city. Sarasota has continued to see more than 5,000 permits pulled each year, according to Neighborhood and Development Services Director Tim Litchett. That has been enough to make sure the building department has always maid money, though part of that comes from staff reductions at City Hall.

Litchett said he is concerned about a lower number of major projects coming on line this year, and said the city wants more projects being permitted in order to keep a solid revenue source for the city. The city is anticipating projects such as Staples and Walmart Neighborhood Market to provide some permit flow.

Both developers and government officials are also hopeful an anticipated master plan for North Tamiami Trail will stimulate development there, but are still awaiting a process encouraging community buy-in on the plan to run its course. SHARE: II 🔟 🧯
